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<u>Traditional Field Trip:</u> Please pick four of the programs listed below for your field trip. All programs are 25 minutes in length. Cost is \$8 per person. If there are less than 10 participants, it is a flat rate of \$80.

Wild About Birds: Why does a duck have webbed feet? Are blue jay feathers really blue? Explore the world of birds through interactive demonstrations. Students will learn the traits of birds and bird adaptations using artifacts and live animals. *Covers PDE Environment and Ecology and Science Standards*.

Birding with Binoculars: Take a guided hike through forests, meadows, and other habitats to observe wildlife. Learn how birds survive in their habitats by finding food, water, shelter, and space. Students get a pair of binoculars to use during the program. *Covers PDE Environment and Ecology and Science Standards.*

Bird Beak Adaptations: What is it like to be a bird foraging for food? Find out in this relay race game where students become birds searching for food in their habitat. Students must find the correct food for their beak shape while avoiding predators. At the end, students will count their food to determine which bird was the most successful in foraging and hypothesize why some food sources are easier to find. *Covers PDE Environment and Ecology, Science, Math Standards.*

Audubon Experience: Step into the world of living history in our 200 year old historic barn. Today, it tells the story of Audubon's life while at Mill Grove and during his travels creating his masterpiece *Birds of America*. Students will discover his artwork through a scavenger hunt, using replicas of his art and elephant-folio book. *Covers PDE Environment and Ecology, Science, History Standards*.

Drawn from Nature: Practice your artistic skills while learning how Audubon made his artwork. Draw birds in their natural habitats using taxidermy and replicas of Audubon's art. For younger students, Audubon coloring pages are available. *Covers PDE Environment and Ecology, Science, and History Standards.*

Nature Scavenger Hunt: Observe the natural world while learning about trees, insects, and birds. Students will work in teams to find everything on the sheet. Basic plant identification will be discussed. *Covers PDE Environment and Ecology and Science Standards*.

Raptor Program: Meet our live non-releasable owls. Learn about the owl species of Pennsylvania and their adaptations that make them superb hunters of the night. For younger students, an owl necklace craft is available. *Covers PDE Environment and Ecology and Science Standards.*

Owl Pellet Dissection: As stealthy hunters, owls are at the top of the food chain. Investigate what they eat by dissecting an owl pellet, the regurgitated, indigestible parts of their food. Match up the bones with the bone chart, determining what animals the owls are eating. *Covers PDE Environment and Ecology, Science, and Math Standards.*

<u>Canoeing Field Trip:</u> \$15 per person, \$150 if less than 10 participants; suitable for 2nd grade and above: Enjoy a guided canoe trip on the Perkiomen Creek, observing waterfowl, herons, turtles, and more! Please pick two other activities from the list above to complete this trip. *Covers PDE Environment and Ecology and Science Standards.*

Stream Ecology Field Trip: \$8 per person, \$80 if less than 10 participants; suitable for 3rd grade and above. This field trip will consist of three activities. Students participate in a macroinvertebrate study of the Perkiomen Creek, complete water testing experiments using pH and nitrate tests, and go on a guided hike through the grounds to learn about stream and forest ecology. Students will determine the health status of the creek using data from their activities. *Covers PDE Environment and Ecology, Science, and Math Standards*.
